
Join the NCPEID Executive Committee or Board of Directors

The APENS Study Group will provide valuable preparation for educators seeking to become Certified Adapted Physical

The study group meets once per month at **5:30pm PST**; 7:30pm CT; 8:30pm EST to focus on various standards using

Updating and Strengthening the Adapted Physical Education National Standards (APENS)

The APENS Committee (Chair Leah Ketcheson, Members, Melissa Bittner, Scott McNamara, Brock McMullen, Andy Pitchford, and Emily Young) is hard at work with areas of focus for this year.

- A **first** priority is the re-validation of APENS standards and test questions. The committee is focused on ensuring these standards remain aligned with current research, best practices, and the evolving needs of APE professionals. This comprehensive process will involve valuable input from educators, researchers, and practitioners to maintain the rigor and relevance of the certification exam.
- The second priority is enhanced marketing and outreach efforts. To increase awareness of APENS certification at both the state and national levels, the committee is planning targeted marketing strategies. These initiatives include leveraging social media platforms and distributing promotional materials at
- conferences such as SHAPE America and state events. A third priority focuses on asynchronous online options for educators in underserved areas, often referred to as "APE deserts." To address the limited access to professional development in these regions, the committee is exploring the creation of flexible, selfpaced learning modules.



University Collaboration with OSEP-Funded Parent Centers

The University of Wisconsin-La Crosse (UWL) has a longstanding partnership with the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP)-funded Parent Training and Information Centers, particularly WI FACETS, Wisconsin's designated center (see full nationwide list <u>here</u>). These centers aim to provide training, resources, and information to parents of children with disabilities to support the educational needs of their children.

For over 15 years, UWL Adapted Physical Education (APE) faculty have actively participated in WI FACETS Training Webinars, focusing on enhancing parents' understanding of APE service delivery. 
Join Project Connect
